Dear Parent/Carer,

Embracing a new school year – Welcome to Key Stage 4

I hope you have had a very enjoyable summer with your family and friends. It is wonderful to welcome you and your daughter back for another year and into Key Stage 4. We have just celebrated the GCSE results achieved by our 'Class of 2022.' These remarkably resilient young people overcame many obstacles to achieve such wonderful and thoroughly deserved outcomes. We have no doubt that we will have another fantastic year to celebrate, as a school community, this year.

As your daughter enters into Year 10, the next two years will be very important in shaping her future. To ensure that you are fully informed about the opportunities and experiences your daughter will have available to her and to help her adopt the very best habits for her studies, we invite you to one of two evening **Year 10 Information Evening** meetings being held on **Wednesday 21st September between 5pm and 7.15pm.**

Year 10 Induction, Exam Preparation and Work Experience Launch Evening for Parents and Students - we would ask that you attend at the following times depending on your daughter's colour family:

5.00pm – 10Blue, 10Gold, 10Green, 10Orange, 10Pink

6.15pm - 10Purple, 10Red, 10Silver, 10White, 10Yellow

Several staff will be presenting on the evening and it would be very beneficial for you to attend with your daughter. There will be formal presentations and also an opportunity to have your individual questions answered and we very much hope to see you there.

I would like to draw your attention to a further two INSET days this term on Wednesday 5th October and Monday 5th December. My vision for the forthcoming year, and indeed my tenure here as a whole, is one where we celebrate the rich and varied diversity of our students, ensuring that we offer many memorable opportunities and life-changing experiences. I see education as the key to unlocking the future potential of our young learners and with this opportunity comes the need for ambition, determination and resilience. I am sure I can count on your support to

achieve the very best for your daughter in developing these traits. As parents, we have all witnessed the very slow release in which we have allowed our children to gain independence. In view of that, we must act as partners working together to ensure that the children continue to grow, on their journey of faith and independence, into becoming the fine adults that we know they will prove to be.

I cannot always claim that we will get every decision we make correct for everybody there are no such things as perfect students, teachers or parents/carers. What I can guarantee is that we will always work to the best of our ability, for each child, and that we offer ourselves to you in a partnership held together by our mutual aspiration for your daughter.

In view of this, I would really like you to work in a supportive partnership with us and to interact in a way which shows our combined care, support and guidance. As part of this supportive partnership I would like to remind you of our mobile phone policy (copy attached) which encourages students to learn to manage the use of their devices in preparation for adulthood. Rather than having a 'no phones' policy which is customary in the vast majority of schools, we allow the use of mobile phones before and after school and at break and lunchtime in designated spaces. We would ask that you discuss this policy with your daughter and support us in implementing it, as using mobile phones inappropriately can lead to confiscation and conversations with parent/carers in relation to any breaches.

As I conclude this letter, I hope you can understand my need to outline a concern which manifested itself on a number of occasions last year. I have waited until the start of this new term to address it as I do not wish my comments to be internalised by any one parent/carer in particular. Undoubtedly due to the difficulties and anxieties experienced within the pandemic, our staff reported issues of being spoken to or communicated with in extremely disrespectful ways on occasions last year. This was invariably the case when being informed of standard sanctions which are applied consistently across the school in accordance with our behaviour/uniform policy. I am sure you can understand that this is never going to be something which is productive when we are all working so hard to give students the very best experience of Davison that we can under very difficult current circumstances.

Our home-school agreement outlines that 'all communications should be rooted in mutual respect.' As we embark upon what is undoubtedly going to be a very difficult year for economic reasons amongst others; It is imperative that we work together to support each other rather than model verbal or written communications which we would not wish to be the recipients of ourselves. On the rare occasions that this does happen, I inform the relevant parent/carers that my colleagues will cease to communicate verbally with parents/carers until I have had a personal meeting to gain reassurance that communications will be more respectful moving forwards. I totally accept that we can disagree, and that at times the school must acknowledge that it could have done better, but I also have to support my staff

in requesting that we must remain respectful in our mutual interactions. I have no doubt that this message will be reflected upon positively by the vast majority of our school community and I would also like to take this opportunity to thank those very many parents/carers who sent in such positive and uplifting comments throughout last year.

I wish you and your daughter an enjoyable and enriching Autumn Term and look forward to meeting you personally at our Year 10 Information Evening.
