More than one photograph layered together




Photo-joiner

A basic camera made from a lightproof box with a small hole in one side


### Key terms - Composition

### Focal Point



Normally the focal point is not central to the painting unless for a good reason.

### Viewpoints



The key point to remember with composition is about variety - just "don't make any two things the same"







Balance Line


Forms –
3D shapes created through tone


Overlapping objects to create interest in the composition

The names in bold indicate the parts explained up until the "Basic Shooting and Image Playback" section (up to p.54).







In Photography, you are taught how to use a DSLR camera.

You will learn about how to adjust settings such as shutter speed, aperture and ISO.
















# Digital Workshops

- You will learn how to make patterns, add text, change colour levels and so much more!










# Transferring Techniques







## How the GCSE is structured

Year 10 & Year 11

### Year 11

### Component 1: Portfolio

#### What's assessed

A portfolio that in total shows explicit coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a sustained project evidencing the journey from initial engagement to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study.

#### How it's assessed

- No time limit
- 96 marks
- 60% of GCSE

Non-exam assessment (NEA) set and marked by the school/college and moderated by AQA during a visit. Moderation will normally take place in June.

### Component 2: Externally set assignment

#### What's assessed

Students respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives.

#### How it's assessed

- Preparatory period followed by 10 hours of supervised time
- 96 marks
- 40% of GCSE

Non-exam assessment (NEA) set by AQA; marked by the school/college and moderated by AQA during a visit. Moderation will normally take place in June.
