

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Sixth form, FE college, or sixth form college? (3 mins)

Sixth form

- Sixth forms are usually on the same site as a secondary school.
- They tend to offer A levels and BTECs.
- They mostly cater to students aged 16-18.

FE college

- FE colleges offer a more independent environment than a school or sixth form.
- They tend to offer A levels,
 BTECs, technical
 qualifications, NVQs, and
 diplomas.
- They cater to students 16+, including adults.

Sixth form college

- Sixth form colleges are like FE colleges as they're not linked to a secondary school.
- They may offer more courses than a traditional sixth form.
- They mostly cater to students aged 16-18.

Sixth form, FE college, or sixth form college?

There's no 'best' further education setting. What's considered a **pro** to one person might be a **con** to another person.

- Familiarity with the setting if you stay at your school's sixth form.
- Smaller class sizes.
- Less subjects and qualifications on offer.
- Less independence.

FE college

- Wide range of subjects.
- Wide range of qualifications: academic and vocational.
- Larger class sizes.
- You'll need to be more selfmotivated and independent.

Sixth form college

- Peers of similar age to you.
- A 'bridge' between school and higher education.
- Larger class sizes.
- You'll need to be more selfmotivated and independent.

	Colleges and Sixth Forms
FE College vs Sixth form	Sixth forms will feel a lot like school whereas FE colleges offer a more independent environment and you'll need to take more responsibility for your learning. Sixth form colleges are something in between. Go to open days and speak to current students to help you work out what suits you best.
Qualifications	Sixth forms tend to offer A levels and BTECS. FE Colleges offer these qualifications and many more including technical qualifications, NVQs, and diplomas. The flexibility and range of options available at colleges can be a big plus.
Level up	Know the level of the qualifications you are doing. GCSEs are level 2; A levels are level 3; BTECs are mostly Level 2 or 3. Other qualifications at colleges vary from levels 1 - 8 so check carefully. Level 4 and above is higher education; undergraduate degrees are level 6.
Applications	You can normally apply to as many colleges and sixth forms as you like. Unless you are staying at your school's own sixth form, you'll often need to write a Personal Statement for each institution outlining why you want to study your chosen courses. You may have to do an interview as well.
Admissions	Your admittance and programme of study at an FE college or sixth form will largely be dictated by your grades. You may be accepted with slightly lower grades on the agreement that you'll resit certain exams / subjects or 'top up' your grades.








How many colleges / sixth forms can I apply to?




Even if you have your heart set on a certain sixth form or college, it's a good idea to give yourself options in case your first choice doesn't work out.






