


Adding an activity



The next few slides will show you how to use the Activities tool.

- After logging into your Unifrog account, scroll down to 'Recording what you've done.'
- Click 'Go to tool' on the 'Activities' tile.




Activities you've done

In your applications you'll need specific examples of Academic and Extracurricular things you've done.


What matters is the skills you demonstrate - the activity itself isn't important (anything from taking care of family members to soap carving works).



Click 'following these 5 tips' for advice about how to describe your activity example.


Emphasise tangible, measurable impact
Who did your activity help? How many people? How much money did you raise?

Instead of: Raised money for children in Africa.

Try: Raised £3,000 to provide 75 uniforms and 3 scholarships for students attending the Waweru School in Kenya.




You'll also be able to log relevant skills, select the dates of the activity, and identify a referee who could attest that you did the activity.




If the activity is ongoing, you can leave the date finished blank.

You can update your example at any time by clicking 'Edit.'


